

# Mate Guarding across the Ovulatory Cycle

Are males more protective when their female partners are ovulating?

### In the original article...

- "That a woman's fertility status is detectable by men is also suggested by studies showing that men's guarding of their mates increases when women are more fertile."
- "Such changes are probably a result of multiple factors, including changes in both female physical traits as well as behavior."



#### Hypotheses

- For pair-bonded women:
  - I. Male sexual attractiveness moderates ovulatory shifts in female extra-pair desires.
  - 2. Male sexual attractiveness moderates ovulatory shifts in male mate guarding.
  - 3. Female physical attractiveness  $\rightarrow$  male mate retention effort across the cycle.
  - 4. Cycle position affects relationship dynamics
- For pair-bonded & single women:
  - 5. Women's subjective feelings of attractiveness increase near ovulation.
  - 6. Near ovulation, women's desire to attend social gatherings where they might meet men increases.



#### Participants


- 38 heterosexual, college women
- 25 are in a relationship
- 7 relationships break up during the study



#### Procedures


- Initial questionnaire
- Experimenter & subject rated subject's attractiveness
- 35 daily questionnaires
  - Attractiveness
  - Flirting behaviors
  - Mate behaviors
  - Relationship dynamics

## Only females with less attractive mates flirted with other men more



#### Only less attractive men mateguarded during mate's ovulation

Not very significant; no correlation when looking at all males



#### More Results

- Women were more likely to flirt and attend social gatherings while ovulating
- Women reported feeling more control and power in the relationship, especially with low-attraction mates



#### Confounds

- Experimenter and self rating of attractiveness
- Rating of mate's attractiveness might have greater implications
- Only 35 days (~I cycle)
- Behavior vs. fertility signals

## Implications for original article

- Relationship between ovulation & mate guarding is weak
  - Possibly weakens argument that ovulation is sensed by males
- "Only short-term but not long-term partner preferences tend to vary with the menstrual cycle."
- "What is the influence of the pill on the ability of women to attract mates? Given that men prefer ovulating women..."
- Does not undercut arguments about female behavioral/preference changes during ovulation
